# EDITORIAL JOY IN HEAVEN



hey lock the gate and then tune the equipment to the highest volume in there," said Joshua (full name withheld for security reasons) of Hausa Christians in northern Nigeria. "So, passers-by on the road hear the messages. They are not seeing the people, but they listen to the messages."

In the part of the world where more Christians are killed for their faith than any other, the gospel is being proclaimed loud and clear.

"They lock the gate and then tune the equipment to the highest volume in there," said Joshua (full name withheld for security reasons) of Hausa Christians in northern Nigeria. "So, passers-by on the road hear the messages. They are not seeing

the people, but they listen to the messages."

Then Joshua, TWR Nigeria director, laughed. "And they are like: This is good."

In "Hausaland," the region straddling the border of Nigeria and Niger in Western Africa, the term "Hausa Christian" might seem to be an oxymoron. Joshua Project, an agency that keeps track of people groups and the extent that they have embraced Christianity, reports only 0.46 percent of

the Hausa people – less than one in two thousand – are Evangelical Christians, and only 0.1 percent of the Hausa in Nigeria.


For those who are Christians, northern Nigeria can be a dangerous place to call home. Open Doors, in its 2024 list of countries where Christians face the most extreme persecu-

tion, ranked Nigeria sixth. But it is No. 1 by far in one area.

"More believers are killed for their faith in Nigeria each year than everywhere else in the world combined," the authors of the report state.

"There are many places at the moment that are no-go areas," acknowledged a Hausa man who is founder of a ministry in northern Nigeria. "So, one of the things we are trusting God to do ... is to [reach people] on media, radio."

the Word of God," Joshua said.

Since Feb. 1, 2020, the Oasis Transmitter has been broadcasting the gospel in Hausa and five other languages widely spoken in Nigeria, said Garth Kennedy, station director for the West Africa Transmitting Station. It supplements the original WATS transmitter, which reaches nine countries, currently in 22 languages.

Although the original transmitter could always be heard in Nigeria, "Nigerians were very vocal about wanting programmes in their languages," Kennedy said.


weekly in the Hausa
language.

That includes *The Way of Right*eousness, *In Touch Ministries*, *The Word Today* and locally generated programmes, among others.

TWR is also developing a programme of testimonies called *My Story with God*, said the Rev. Abdoulaye Sangho, TWR West Africa director. "I am confident this programme will reach many people and touch many people's lives," he said.

But according to Joshua, TWR is involved in reaching to this people group in other ways:

- Distribution of about 2 800
  Hausa Bibles (with the support of the Heralds of Hope ministry).
- Radio distribution.
- Creation of listening

- groups.
- Establishing an Every Man a Warrior Discipleship group in one Nigerian state.
- Starting Women of Hope ministries in two Nigerian states.

Some of the radio and Bible distributions occurred in internally displaced persons (IDP) camps, developed as refuges for people fleeing from insurgency in the North.

"And some of them began confessing they thought life was finished for them after they were displaced," Joshua said.

"But when TWR came with Bibles, came with messages [so] they could tune in and listen to the Word, they said hope began to come back to them. ... People started giving their lives to Jesus."

"The Holy Spirit clearly is working among the Hausa," Joshua added.

"We need prayers," he said. "Seriously, because when the Spirit of God works it opens up the hearts of these people."

Sangho, director of Radio Evangile FM in Yamoussoukro, Côte d'Ivoire, wasn't in trouble. "He really wanted to talk to me and tell me how it has been impacting his life," Sangho said of the officer.

That's an example of the kind of response Radio Evangile has received since July 22, 2022, when the TWR (Trans World Ra-

dio) partner began operating its own FM station for the first time.

Speaking in French through a translator, Sangho and Florence Mbamba, national director of Radio Evangile, shared their excitement about the work God has called them to in Côte d'Ivoire.

With an estimated population under 200 000, according to World Population Review, Yamoussoukro is dwarfed by the city of Abidjan (estimated population 3.6 million). The

latter might have seemed to be the natural place to start a radio station.

The road to obtaining any FM license anywhere in the country, however was long and hard. David's father, the Rev. Abdoulaye Sangho, who is TWR international director for West Africa, first applied in 1996. It was not until January 2021 that the license finally was granted – for Yamoussoukro. The airwayes of Abidjan were saturated.

In a separate interview, Abdou-

laye Sangho said Abidjan already has strong Christian radio stations. He sits on the board of one, which broadcasts TWR content.

"So having the station in Yamoussoukro where we can reach people in ... the centre of the country of Côte d'Ivoire, I think that's a good plan from God," he said. "Sometimes, his plan is

not our plan, and his plan is alwavs the best."

Being in the smaller city has turned out to be a blessing, David Sangho said. "The fact that we're in Yamoussoukro makes it easier to get close to listeners."

For example, when the station has contests, participants are invited to come to the station to pick up their prizes. It allows for interaction with listeners, he said.

Radio Evangile Côte d'Ivoire also has connected with potential listeners by distributing radios in the region. So far, 500 radio sets have been distributed

in 10 villages, Mbamba said. But they have 270 villages to serve. "We are waiting for new ones to come so we can do it again."

Each set also has a place for an SD card, Abdoulage Sangho said, so if people are beyond the range of the FM signal (60-70 kilometres), they can still hear the content. Across the region, 50 listener groups have formed to discuss the teachings, he said. They number anywhere from 10 to 50 people. There's even an adult-led children's group that meets to listen to and learn from a programme intended for them.

When people hear the programmes, they receive content that makes a difference, both for evangelism and discipleship.

Many pastors in the region live like nonbelievers and even quit preaching because they don't know what to say, Mbamba said. But a pastor came to her and told her he had learned how to preach appropriately by listening to Radio Evangile, and he had gone back to teaching in his church.

A blind man approached Mbamba saying he had stopped going to church because he was mad at God. He couldn't understand why God wasn't taking care of him.

"But starting to listen to Radio Evangile changed his mind," she said. "It was like: The problem was not God, but him. Now he's back on track, going to church, and he's believing again."


# MEN OF COURAGE ADDRESSING THE SPIRITUAL NEEDS OF MUSLIM MEN

ndoubtedly, the data shows that the increase in Islamic terrorism in the Sahel was dramatic, increasing by over 2 000% in the last 15 years. Furthermore, the political situation in the Sahel, the military coups, adds to this increase, with 7 coup attempts since 2021, of which 6 were successful (Mali, Burkina Faso, Niger, Guinea Conakry, Sudan and Gabon).

According to a Reichman University report published in 2023 – The African continent has become a central hotbed of violent Islamic extremism, with a significant increase in terrorist attacks on the continent in recent years.

The peak of extremism is expressed in the violent struggle between many radical Islamic terrorist organizations operating under the umbrella organizations of radical Islam on the continent... The Sahel region of sub-Saharan Africa recorded



more deaths from terrorism in 2022 than both South Asia, the Middle East and North Africa combined.

The African continent, despite the extensive deployment of initiatives to combat Islamic terrorism in recent years, remains an arena for the rise of international jihad.

According to a study by the African Centre for Strategic Studies conducted by Dr. Claudia Piper Cruz, published in February 2023, violence related to militant Islamist groups in Africa increased sharply, by 22% during 2022, with 6 859 incidents. This is a new record of extreme violence, and it has more than doubled since 2019.

Deaths in the Sahel accounted for 43% of the global total in 2022, compared to only 1% in 2007. Of particular concern are Burkina Faso and Mali, which accounted for 73% of terrorist deaths in the Sahel in 2022 and 52% of all deaths from terrorism in sub- Saharan Africa.


Both countries recorded a significant increase in terrorism, with deaths in Burkina Faso increasing by 50% to 1 135 and in Mali by 56% to 944. Attacks in these countries are also becoming more deadly, with the number of deaths per attack increasing by 48% from 2021. Most attacks in these countries are attributed to unknown ji-


hadists even though both ISIS and JNIM operate in these countries. The escalation of violence in Burkina Faso has also spread to neighbouring countries, with Togo and Benin recording their worst GTI (Global Terrorism Index) scores.

In the heart of West and Central Africa, a transformative initiative is taking root. TWR Men of Courage (MOC), a pre-evange-listic programme with a global scope, is emerging as a beacon of hope for Muslim men facing the challenges of extreme social pressure. Tested in Turkey and Indonesia, this ground breaking ministry is now gearing up for a French version to reach the Francophone region of Africa.

At the helm of this ambitious project is Dr. Konate (last name withheld for security purposes), a pastor and theologian with a unique background – he hails



from a Muslim family. Out of his 11 siblings, 8 have already embraced the teachings of Christ. Dr. Konate's personal journey adds a profound layer to his leadership, bringing a deep understanding of the cultural and religious intricacies involved.

Recently, the TWR Men of Courage global leadership team led by David Carlsen and Wolfgang Brinkmann descended upon Abidjan to conduct intensive training workshops with Dr. Konate and the WeCAf leadership team. From the 8th to the 12th of January, this collaboration unfolded, unveiling a vision that goes beyond traditional evangelism.

Men in the Muslim world grapple with the weighty respon-

sibilities of leadership in both society and family. They are the breadwinners, culturally bound to maintain face and avoid casting shame on relatives and relationships.

> h**i**s struggle often leads to suppressed emotions, loneliness, and frustration. It is within this crucible of challenges that TWR Men of Courage aims to bring a fresh perspective.

The MOC initiative is a doubleedged sword, sharpened not just to penetrate the hearts of local audiences but to empower local ministry partners to create culturally relevant content. It is designed around five pillars, each reinforcing the mission: audience focus, a standardized blueprint, equal partnership, empowerment through train-

The heart of MOC lies in its three-part episode structure. carefully crafted to resonate across various platforms. An appetizer of 10-30 seconds sets the stage, followed by a 3-5 minute drama that captivates, and finally, a 15-30 minute podcast/talk show that delves deeper. This format ensures engagement while delivering Christian values subtly, pointing men to Christ and biblical principles.

The collaboration between the global MOC team and local partners lays a solid foundation for innovation and creativity. The initiative goes beyond a one-time effort, intending

scripts," guidelines, and templates. These resources, born out of the collective wisdom of the TWR global Men of Courage team, will empower local teams to produce unique, context-sensitive episodes for the future.

In the midst of this transformative journey, Dr. Konate stands as a bridge between worlds. His personal story, his understanding of the challenges faced by Muslim men, and his commitment to the TWR Men of Courage mission make him a pivotal figure in the endeavour to bridge faith and culture.

As the global MOC team witnessed firsthand the challenges of reaching Muslim men in this part of the world during their recent visit to Abidjan, conversations with other ministry leaders further enriched the understanding of the unique burden faced by those aiming to minister to Muslims



and converts from the Islamic prayer gathering religion.

The TWR Men of Courage initiative in the Francophone region signals not only a strategic move to address a pressing need but also a commitment to empowering local communities. Dr. Konate's passion, coupled with the collaborative efforts of the global and local teams, paints a vivid picture of a ministry that goes beyond borders, cultures, and languages. It is a testament to the power of media in advancing the message of Christianity, bringing a fresh perspective on life and eternity to those who need it most.

As the MOC initiative unfolds in West and Central Africa, the significance of the project becomes increasingly clear.

Dr. Konate's role as the champion in the Francophone region adds a unique dimension. 

Jean-Anath and Charlene returned from Côte d'Ivoire to his native Gabon in October 2020, when TWR invited him to join its work. In their first nine months, Jean-Anath had programming agreements with eight FM radio stations and Charlene had set up 55 Women of Hope prayer groups.

"We have partners in Congo Brazzaville, we have partners here in Gabon," Jean-Anath said. "Now we also have partners in the Republic of Central Africa. ... So, we partner with them, and we will send them the programmes so that they'll reach more people there."

The studio was completed in October 2023 with help from Nate McGurk, TWR team leader for audio and acoustics on the Global Engineering Team. Paul Van Egdom, global training consultant for TWR, arrived in late January to support the Ndoukous' programme development.

living in trauma in the Central Africa sub region in mind.

Another demographic group also needs to hear the Word, Jean-Anath said.

"Even here in Libreville we have many young people," he said. "The youth, they are going through many difficulties, too. So, we want to introduce Jesus among young people."

The Ndoukous' plan to provide programmes to meet the particular needs in various coun-



tries, including people scarred by war in the Democratic Republic of Congo and special needs faced by women in Cameroon.

The Aug. 30 military coup in Gabon has been received cautiously in the West, with the U.S. cutting off most aid to the government. But Jean-Anath said the coup so far has only enhanced the presentation of the gospel.
